## REMEMBERING HUNTER'S GARAGE ON MAIN STREET



Many in our community were saddened to hear that the building once known as Hunter's Garage, located on Main Street, burned on Monday, November 10. Thankfully, no one was hurt, though it was a total loss.

Ken Jones shared, the building was once used by Duane Barton to house the first ambulance, later became a TV repair shop run by Jack Allen, and even served as an auto parts store.

Brenda Hewett remembered, *"Jack's wife Fran was my first babysitter when my mom worked at the Post Office. Our first Zenith color TV came from Jack—what excitement seeing that peacock in full color for the first time! Ron Vandenburg also ran his well-drilling business from that building. We neighborhood kids spent many winters climbing up and down the hill behind it to ice skate on the pond that my grandfather, Kneland Hewett, owned."*

Sandy Farah added, *"And for a very short time, it was a second-hand bookstore run by, I believe, Randy Brown's older brother. I bought a copy of The House of Seven Gables there."*

Sandy also recalls many fond memories of skating on Brenda's grandfather's pond.

Even after the fire, it's clear the building left its mark on everyone. We're grateful to the firefighters for their quick response, and most of all, thankful that no one was injured.



## REMEMBERING MAXINE CHRISTMAN

President Ken Jones informed the Board of Directors that Maxine Christman passed away on January 10 after a battle with cancer, saying, "Maxine and Rick have been friends of mine for many years."

Maxine worked at the cafeteria at a local school and, after retirement, did some lay preaching, including at the Presbyterian Church in Esperance. She was also a reenactor and had an interest in textiles. In the summer of 2025, she presented a program to the Historical Society on the Code Talkers of WWII, and Rick assisted with our Soup and Stroll walking tour.

President Ken Jones informed the Board of Directors that Kathie W. Rockwell passed away on January 11 after a long illness. Ken noted that Kathie served as an officer of the Historical Society and as Town Historian before him.

She was also Treasurer of the Braman Corners Union Cemetery for many years. Kathie enjoyed crocheting, following NASCAR, and sharing her time and talents with the community she cared deeply about.
